Currently, experts are researching to identify the cause and determine whether the respiratory illness is caused by a new pathogen or a flare-up of existing ones. These flare-ups happen periodically, and there is a spectrum of severity across impacted pets, which is why we always recommend keeping your pets up to date on their vaccines. Regardless, prevention measures remain consistent. Respiratory diseases in dogs typically spread through air, close contact, or sharing food and water, particularly communal water bowls.

To safeguard your pet, we recommend adhering to the following guidelines:

- 1. Limit contact with dogs of unknown health or vaccination status.
- 2. Avoid communal food and water bowls in public spaces.
- Ensure your dog is up to date on vaccinations for Bordetella, Canine Parainfluenza virus, and Canine Influenza.
- 4. Watch for symptoms such as coughing, nasal or eye discharge, fever (above 102.5), lethargy, loss of appetite, or difficulty breathing.

If you observe any of these signs, please contact us. For safety reasons, we may opt for curbside appointments or ask you to wait in your car until an exam room is available, preventing potential exposure to other pets. Our facility prioritizes the safety of your beloved pets, implementing enhanced isolation and cleaning protocols.
